Title frames in this case make no sense. Instead, the `\maketitle` command will take over the top of the page (adjusting for how much text is in the poster). To it you can add the same information as before (author, institution, date (if desired)).

As you would expect, the size of the font used can be changed arbitrarily: This is

You can have regular bullet/enumerated lists, just like in slideshows, though of course there are no transition animations available this time.

One Important Thing
Block commands work just like they did for presentations.

This is especially useful when trying to highlight information on a slide, and is part of the framework for the beamer version of built in commands like theorem or example.

You can still use math like before. This particular example demonstrates more advanced features, like underbraces. Note that the font in math mode is now sans serif.

The columns environment can be used to change the layout of a slide. You can even add images in the columns:



Tabular environments are used to create tables. They take arguments on where to align the text in each cell ('l' for left, 'r' for right, 'c' for center). The divisions (marked by `&`'s between columns and `\\` between rows).
